GOD'S WORD

READING: Isaiah 35:1-10 Contemporary English Version The prophet describes the return from the Babylonian captivity as a joyous procession to Zion. God's coming reign will bring a renewal of creation in which health and wholeness will be restored. There is no need for fear, for God is coming to save.

This is a reading from the prophet Isaiah, chapter 35. Here is a message for all who are weak, trembling, and worried: "Cheer up! Don't be afraid.

Your God is coming to punish your enemies. God will take revenge on them and rescue you." The blind will see, and the ears of the deaf will be healed.

Those who were lame will leap around like deer; tongues once silent will shout for joy.

Water will rush through the desert.

Scorching sand will turn into a lake, and thirsty ground will flow with fountains.

Grass will grow in deserts,

where packs of wild dogs once made their home.

A good road will be there,

and it will be named "God's Sacred Highway."

It will be for God's people;

no one unfit to worship God will walk on that road.

And no fools can travel on that highway.

No lions or other wild animals will come near that road; only those the LORD has saved will travel there.

The people the LORD has rescued

will come back singing as they enter Zion.

Happiness will be a crown everyone will always wear.

They will celebrate and shout because all sorrows and worries will be gone far away.

This is God's Word, our hope.

HOLY GOSPEL: Matthew 11:2-11

John the Baptist expects the Messiah to bring God's judgment upon the earth (Matt. 3:11-12). From a prison cell, he wonders whether Jesus is the one who will do this. Jesus' response indicates that God's reign is indeed being fulfilled already through healing and restoration.

This is the Holy Gospel as the Word was given to Matthew, the 11th chapter. When John heard in prison what the Messiah was doing, he sent word by his disciples and said to him, "Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another?" Jesus answered them, "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them. And blessed is anyone who takes no offense at me."

As they went away, Jesus began to speak to the crowds about John: "What did you go out into the wilderness to look at? A reed shaken by the wind? What then did you go out to see? Someone dressed in soft robes? Look, those who wear soft robes are in royal palaces. What then did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. This is the one about whom it is written,

'See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you.'

Truly I tell you, among those born of women no one has arisen greater than John the Baptist; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he."

This is the Good News of Christ's victory!

John of the Cross, renewer of the church, died 1591

John was a monk of the Carmelite religious order who met Teresa of Àvila when she was working to reform the Carmelite Order and return it to a stricter observance of its rules. He followed Teresa's lead and encouraged others to follow her reform. He was imprisoned when he encountered opposition to the reform. His writings, like Teresa's, reflect a deep interest in mystical thought and meditation. In one of John's poems, "The Spiritual Canticle," he cried, "Oh, that my griefs would end! Come, grant me thy fruition full and free!"
